January 26

Chairman Wright called the meeting to order at 12:45 p.m. Commissioners McDermott, Trevey, Barowsky, Budge, Wheeler and Power were present.

MISCELLANEOUS

Commissioners met with the Senate Resources and Environment Committee.

The Commissioners reconvened at 3:45 p.m.

Executive Session

11-04 Commissioner Power moved and Commissioner Barowsky seconded a motion to go into executive session pursuant to subsections (b) (c) (d) and (f) of Idaho Code Section 67-2345 to discuss personnel matters, property acquisition, records exempt from disclosure under Idaho Public Records law, and pending litigation. Roll Call Vote: **McDermott: aye; Trevey: aye; Barowsky: aye; Wheeler: aye; Wright aye; Power: aye. Vote tally: 6 ayes.**

Commissioner Budge joined the executive session at 4:30 p.m.

11- 05 Commissioner Power moved and Commissioner Barowsky seconded a motion to come out of executive session. The motion carried in a unanimous vote.

The executive session ended at 5:46 p.m. with no official action taken.

Public Hearing

Chairman Wright called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. He introduced Commissioners Tony McDermott, Robert Barowsky, Randy Budge, Cameron Wheeler, and Commission Secretary Cal Groen. Commissioner Power was excused. Staff introductions followed.

Chairman Wright noted that Representative Marcus Gibbs and Chairman Bert Stevenson were in attendance.

Bryce Cook, Idaho Waterfowl Association, spoke in opposition of waterfowl outfitting and guiding. Please see a copy of the IWA letter to the Commission (Appendix 44, Exhibit 2). Mr. Bryce was a member of the Turkey Waterfowl Working Group.

Mike Lawson is an outfitter and a land owner. Mr. Lawson was also a member of the Turkey Waterfowl Working Group. Mr. Lawson expressed concerns with statute Title 36, Chapter 21 where there has been some disagreement on, regarding outfitting and guiding. Please see written comments (Appendix 44, Exhibit 3).

Michael Taddy, representing self, spoke in opposition to guiding for waterfowl. Mr. Taddy feels that this would have impacts on public access and hunting quality.

Marcus O'Connor stated that he is opposed to waterfowl guiding

John Wood, IWA, is opposed to outfitting for waterfowl.

Joe Curry, representing the Idaho Chapter Wild Sheep Foundation stated that they support the Department legislation proposal to add additional trophy tags (Appendix 44, Exhibit 4). They would recommend the Department open Units 13 and 18 to bighorn sheep hunting with no tags allocated, however the successful bidder for the special bighorn sheep permit will be allowed to hunt in Unit 13 or 18 during the period that the tag is valid in any other open bighorn sheep hunt except Unit 11.

Herb Meyr, representing self spoke regarding bighorn sheep. Mr. Meyr is concerned with the bighorn sheep numbers in the East Fork of the Owyhee and the bighorn sheep that used to be on the South Fork of the Owyhee.

Daniel Luker, representing IWA and self, stated that waterfowl outfitting is not needed. It will cause competition for an already scarce access and will be difficult to enforce.

Paul Waldon was a member on the Turkey Waterfowl Working Group. Mr. Waldon is a member of the NWTF. NWTF opposes any expansion of outfitting for turkey or waterfowl. Access would be reduced and displaced public. He would like for the verbiage from temporary Moratorium to be permanent and feels it is the simplest and most enforceable solution for the licensing board.

Mike Stoddard, President, NWTF, stated that they are opposed to outfitting for turkey and waterfowl. Mr. Stoddard referenced a letter sent to Jake Howard, IOGLB (Appendix 44, Exhibit 5). NWTF does not support any changes to the current temporary moratorium, but request that IOGLB take the necessary steps making that moratorium permanent.

Anne Hausrath spoke regarding the role of predators and wolves. Ms. Hausrath would like the Department to have a science based biology management plan for wolves.

Chris Loomis, IWA, is opposed to outfitting for waterfowl and turkeys.

Lloyd Oldenburg spoke regarding auction tags. He supports the Idaho Wild Sheep Foundation recommendations presented by Joe Curry.

Ruth Shea, stated that she was here on behalf of the Trumpeter Swan Society to express their concern regarding the late snow goose hunt in the Fort Hall area and to ask the Department to

take three actions, (Appendix 44, Exhibit 6) to help strengthen Idaho's Trumpeter Swan management program.

Tom Demorest, Diamond D Ranch spoke regarding seasons for cow elk hunts. He would like to see the Department eliminate cow hunting in Unit 27, suggests a 4 point or bigger for elk hunting and reports deer hunting is excellent. Suggested the unlimited controlled hunt in November be eliminated and implement a 3 point for the whole season.

Will Whelan, The Nature Conservancy, expressed thanks to the IDFG staff who have worked with Conservancy on projects in 2010, staff is dedicated and deserve support. There have been four completed projects that the Department has worked on with the Nature Conservancy.

Butch Sour commented about wolves. He stated that he will not purchase a license until this problem is taken care of in the state of Idaho and will not allow access on his property.

Trish Woodruff spoke regarding wolves and feels there is an economic opportunity with wolves.

Mark Bell presented signatures from a group of sportsmen from Challis, stating that they feel it would not be in the best interest to relinquish the Fish & Game authority over the ATV's to the Parks & Recreation Department.

Crystal White submitted written comment regarding strong support for the wolves.

Diane Jones spoke regarding wolf management and the value of wolves as a top predator.

Karl DeHart would like for the Commission to change the partridge season back to historic dates and limits.

Gene Sullivan stated that he has questions regarding snow goose seasons and that he would speak directly to Jeff Knetter, Regional Wildlife Biologist - Upland Game & Waterfowl who was in attendance.

Louise Stark, White Cloud Outfitters, provided the Commission with a written plan to promote nonresident elk tag sales and hold line on any further zone phase in and controlled hunt tag reductions (Appendix 44, Exhibit 7).

Paul Waldon suggests the Commission look at a new concept Transfer Tag To Youth (TTY) for the recruitment of youth. This would allow for an adult to transfer a tag to youth for a hunt.

Joseph Peterson submitted written comment (Appendix 44, Exhibit 8) and stated that he was part of the Turkey Waterfowl Working Group. Mr. Peterson would like to see outfitting allowed for turkey and waterfowl. He referenced Title 36, Fish and Game Chapter 21, Outfitters and Guides.

MISCELLANEOUS

Opening Comments

Chairman Wright called the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m. Chairman Wright stated that the Commission will meet with the House Resources and Conservation Committee this afternoon and thanks to Mary Boyer and staff for meeting preparation.

Review of Public Comment

Director Groen noted that the public meeting went very smoothly and efficiently due to the new meeting format with the blue cards that address agenda items first and the timing light restriction for comments. There were 26 comments.

The Commission addressed comments relating to outfitting for waterfowl and turkey. Agenda item # 5 will address the results from the Turkey Waterfowl Working group. The Commission discussed the request from the Trumpeter Swan Society. Jeff Knetter provided a handout on snow goose hunting near American Falls Reservoir (Appendix 44, Exhibit 9) in regards to the Society request. Commission consensus is not to take any action and work collaboratively with the Society in the future. A proposal called Transfer Tag To Youth (TTY) that would include all species was presented. Commissioner Budge would like staff to take a look at this proposal. Staff will discuss with regional staff regarding comments on Oregon Owyhee Sheep losses are due to mountain lions. Comments on auction tags for Unit 13 & 18 will be addressed in agenda item # 14.

MISCELLANEOUS

Consent Calendar

The January consent calendar contained the minutes of the October 15 and 28, 2010 meetings; the Financial Report for the period ending November 30, 2010; and the appointments for the Winter Feeding Advisory Committee.

11-06 Commissioner Budge moved and Commissioner Barowsky seconded a motion to accept the items in the consent calendar as presented. The motion carried in a unanimous vote.

REPORT

Turkey Waterfowl Workgroup Report

Background: At the November 2009 joint meeting between the Commission and the Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board (OGLB) staff from both agencies gave information relative to the temporary moratorium on outfitting for Waterfowl and Turkey Hunting (IOGLB Policy 2027). It was recognized that due to the increased interest in these activities and due to Idaho's administrative decision making requirement in state law, a more comprehensive approach was needed so IOGLB can appropriately address these matters. An advisory work group was formed by a series of appointments made jointly with the Department and IOGLB.

The advisory work group was formed to:

- 1) To understand the current conditions around the issue,
- 2) To find areas of agreement,
- 3) To prioritize possible solutions,
- 4) To make policy recommendations to the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board (IOGLB) and Commission, and
- 5) To be clear on whether the recommendations for turkeys and waterfowl were the same or needed to be different in some regards.

Deputy Director Virgil Moore introduced Richard L. Gardner, Ph.D. facilitator for the group. Dr. Gardner presented the final recommendations (Appendix 44, Exhibit 10) to both agencies and a summary of the process they followed to arrive at these recommendations.

RULES

Trophy Species Season Setting

Dale Toweill presented the Department recommendations (Appendix 44, Exhibit 11) for moose, sheep and goat for the 2011 and 2012 seasons.

11-07 Commissioner Power moved and Commissioner Budge seconded a motion to accept the staff recommendations for moose, sheep and goat for the 2011 and 2012 seasons. The motion carried in a unanimous vote.

REPORTS

Deer and Elk Population Status Update

Jon Rachael, State Wildlife Manager, provided a deer and elk population status report (Appendix 44, Exhibit 12) to the Commission. Commissioner Budge commends Jon Rachael for an excellent report and suggests that it be used as a tool in the regions and available at public meetings.

Mandatory Harvest Report Briefing

Mr. Rachael continued with a report on the Mandatory Harvest Reporting system (Appendix 44, Exhibit 13). There were 221,300 deer, elk, pronghorn tags sold in 2010. As of January 19, 2011 124,100 tags had been reported. Seventy-eight percent of the reports were filed on-line with 16 % reported by phone operator and 6% by automated system. The Department moved towards an all-electronic, paperless system for the 2010 season to expedite data collection time. Allowing the Department to analyze and share harvest information with wildlife managers and the public sooner and reduce costs. The estimated cost savings is \$96,000 compared to past years. The savings will be used to leverage PR dollars and appears in our FY2012 base budget request.

Ungulate Predation Research Update

Brad Compton provided an update to the Commission using a PowerPoint presentation (Appendix 44, Exhibit 14). Since 1997, the Department has focused intensive elk investigations on determining the population level impacts of predation. Initially, the investigations were focused on the impacts of black bear and mountain lion predation. Since 2005, the focus shifted to evaluating population level impacts of wolf predation. Between 2005 - 2008, biologists captured and monitored over 700 adult female and calf elk in 11 of 29 elk management zones to determine survival and cause-specific mortality. Results from this work were and are used to: 1) develop 10(j) proposals, 2) provide a foundation for elk and wolf harvest recommendations, and 3) provide science-backed information to the public and policy makers.

Beginning in 2009, intensive elk investigations were restructured to develop a management tool that could reliably estimate wolf impacts on elk populations more cost-effectively and across all elk management zones in Idaho.

In September 2010, the Department submitted a 10(j) proposal to the USFWS requesting approval to remove wolves from the Lolo Elk Management Zone because of unacceptable impacts. Upon implementation, the Department would continue to intensively monitor elk and wolf populations to evaluate effectiveness of the management effort.

Update on Salmon Forecasts and Potential Seasons in 2011

Pete Hassemer, Anadromous Fish Manager provided the Commission with an explanation, to inform the Commission, of the forecasts for spring and summer Chinook salmon returning to the Snake River this spring and potential salmon seasons. These salmon will begin leaving the ocean and entering the Columbia River in late February and early March. Fisheries staff proposes to return to the Commission in March with recommendations for 2010 Chinook salmon sport fisheries to be conducted in the Clearwater River, Salmon River and Snake River drainages. During January and February Fisheries staff will be involved in Columbia River basin processes that set spring Chinook fishing seasons on the Columbia River. Mr. Hassemer described the season setting processes and the potential impacts of Columbia River fisheries on Idaho-bound salmon (Appendix 44, Exhibit 15).

Land Acquisitions Hayden Lake and Cooper

Gregg Servheen, Wildlife Program Coordinator, presented the following land acquisitions proposals to the Commission for approval.

Hayden Lake

This 203-acre fee title acquisition is located in Kootenai County to the northeast of Hayden Lake and is adjacent to U.S. Forest Service ownership and the 320-acre Vanderbilt conservation easement held by the Department. Acquisition of the subject property will preserve habitat and recreational opportunities in a rapidly developing area. Protection of the site would retain habitat for upland and big game species and a variety of non-game species in an area that is quickly being developed. In addition, neighbors to the subject property have stated that they would donate a 110-acre conservation easement to the Department if the property were to become protected.

Acquisition of this parcel will also provide partial habitat mitigation for the construction and operation of Albeni Falls Dam and abides by IDFG goals outlined in the Albeni Falls Wildlife Protection, Mitigation, and Enhancement Plan. A new management plan will need to be developed for the property, and additional BPA funding will be added to the existing operations and maintenance contract for the Department's Wildlife Management Areas.

No buildings are part of the acquisition. IDFG pays a fee in lieu of taxes (FILT) for all fee-title properties. The FILT for properties acquired in Kootenai County is estimated at approximately \$2.24 per acre, for a total of approximately \$454.72 for the subject property.

The property was previously presented to the Commission during Executive Session on May 20, 2010.

Cooper Land Acquisition

This 11.63-acre property borders the Salmon River 3 miles north of the town of Salmon. This project would ensure public access to one of the most heavily used sections of the Salmon River. Fishing/boating conflicts and boating safety issues would be minimized and steelhead fishing pressure distributed from Salmon to Morgan Bar. This property was previously presented to the Commission during Executive Session in April of 2010.

Acquisition cost is \$283,500 of Salmon and Steelhead funds. FILT is estimated at \$1,200/year. O&M costs are estimated at \$1,000 annually.

11-08 Commissioner McDermott moved and Commissioner Power seconded a motion to accept the land acquisitions as presented by staff. The motion carried in a unanimous vote.

FISCAL

Director's Annual Report to the Commission

Director Groen presented the *Director's Annual Report to the Commission* (Appendix 44, Exhibit 16) showing Department financial summaries for FY10 and an overview of major Department programs. Director Groen noted that this is the second report to the Commission and copies will be sent to the Legislature.

Director Groen expressed his thanks to Mike Keckler, Ed Mitchell and staff for the great job in putting the report together.

JFAC Budget Preview

On Tuesday, February 1 the Department will present the Governor's Fiscal Year 2012 budget for IDFG to the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee (JFAC). The Director provided the Commission with a preview of his planned presentation to JFAC for their information and input. This presentation focused upon the role of the Commission in setting key policy direction and the actions of the Department to carry out Commission policy.

MISCELLANEOUS

Commissioners recessed to meet with the House Resources and Conservation Committee.

The Commission reconvened at 3:55 p.m.

RULES

Proposed Rule to Exempt Military Members and Peace Officers From the Live Fire Exercise Requirement of the Hunter Education Course

Sharon Kiefer, Assistant Director-Policy, briefed the Commission about a legislative request to consider Hunter Education live fire exercise exemption for military personnel and peace officers that could result in a rule change in IDAPA 13.01.02. Ms. Kiefer presented a draft of the rule to the Commission (Appendix 44, Exhibit 17). Prior to the beginning of the legislative session, a moratorium is imposed on state agencies that restrict them from promulgating proposed rules. This moratorium on proposed rulemaking begins in mid-November and is in effect until the adjournment of the legislature session. Staff will present the rule for Commission action at the first scheduled opportunity after the legislature session concludes, likely the May meeting. Commission consensus is to draft an affidavit similar to what the bowhunters sign to verify that they have had firearm training.

LEGISLATION

Legislative Update

Kathleen Trever, Deputy Attorney General reported that congressmen Simpson, Rehberg and Labrador introduced wolf management legislation HR 150, Idaho and Montana Wolf Management Act of 2011 to address the issue of delisting wolves in Idaho and Montana.

Sharon Kiefer, Assistant Director-Policy, provided the Commission with a Legislative update. Ms. Kiefer reported that status for the Department Rule Dockets is still the same as the report on January 20 conference call. The JFAC presentation is February 2nd. On February 7th there will be a joint House and Senate Resource meeting to discuss ATV's. The Department has been invited to give a presentation to the Senate Agriculture Affairs Committee on February 8th about the challenges of private property issues, access, landowner sportsmen programs and wildlife management with private land owners. On February 9th there will be a joint Resource Committee meeting regarding bull trout.

Fish and Game Sponsored Bill/Analysis/Discussion

RS 19980 Department Proposal

RS20142 Proposal / Representative Mike Moyle

The Commission directed staff at the previous January 20 conference call to sit down with Representative Moyle to discuss the options for a single collaborative legislative proposal for auction tags. Staff has met with Representative Moyle and have resolved several of the differences between the two proposals. There are two key policy considerations in regards to a potential bill 1) Representative Moyle's special auction tag proposal would establish a more liberal but more financially lucrative framework for tags. Allowing hunting in any hunt area, even areas closed by Commission proclamation between August 1st and December 31st of the same calendar year.

The Department proposal took a different approach that the proposal still restricted use of the special auction tags to open seasons and open hunt areas.

Representative Moyle's proposal retains the new bighorn sheep tag available for residents and nonresidents. The Department has provided technical information as to what that means to the regular control hunt pool for nonresidents. That would reallocate another tag from the pool of five tags. This would increase the drawing odd for nonresidents for those who choose to participate in the controlled hunt for bighorn sheep.

In regards to the discussion on being able to hunt in any area this would set up the potential for the new bighorn sheep tag to also be used in Unit 11 on an annual basis. The current context is that the Department has two existing bighorn sheep special, one tag is lottery and one is auction. They alternate each year for which one can be used in Unit 11. This would be an additional tag that would not have that restriction.

The Department is seeking guidance from the Commission for a collaborative path to follow recognizing that there may be some concerns with these two policy issues.

The Commission discussed the two policy issues and their concerns. Some of the Commission concerns are existing seasons regarding the Tribes hunting and that there are two special tags already out there for bighorn sheep, with a small population that they go to with a high dollar

value. People do not want to sell wildlife. The Commission is concerned with having two proposals with the same subject matter.

Dale Toweill reported four issues that he sees with RS20142

- Timing and lack of area restrictions
- Biological Auction/Lottery
- Equity- nonresident high dollar
- How do we exercise control such as the tribe framework

Ms. Kiefer will follow up with Legislative Services to remove the bighorn sheep from the Department proposal. Ms. Kiefer will communicate with Representative Moyle that the Commission has had this policy discussion and the Commission felt that this is an element of the bill that they are not going to be able to support, as well as the sheep tag as it is currently framed. The Commission would like to know if Representative Moyle would be interested in any further reconsideration of how the bill is framed.

REPORT

Idaho Fish and Wildlife Foundation Report

Ann Dehner, Foundation Development Coordinator, presented the IFWF report to the Commission. Ms. Dehner introduced Board member Jim Wrigley who was in attendance.

1. The Foundation acquired a 5.2 acre property along the Little Salmon River near Riggins, Idaho, on January 4, 2011. The Foundation will engage the Department in discussions regarding leasing and management of the property, and explore issues and needs surrounding fishing access at the site.
2. The Foundation is suspending its annual online auction for this year pending strategic planning.
3. The Foundation is continuing a comprehensive strategic planning process to update its last strategic plan that expired in 2008. It is anticipated that the future direction for programs, projects and operations of the Foundation will be identified through this process. The Foundation wishes to engage members of the Fish and Wildlife Commission in this process and will solicit the Commission's input as the process unfolds.

MISCELLANEOUS

Director's Report

Director Groen captured the following topics in the Director's Report to the Commission:

- Individual written Bureau Reports contained in the agenda book, good information
- Referenced January 18, 2011 letter (Appendix 44, Exhibit 18) from RMEF extending gratitude for the continued support of Idaho Fish and Game's purchase of the Tex Creek property in the Tex Creek Wildlife Management Area of Idaho

- A Task Force group is being established to look at the License System and ways to simplify the system
- The Department will have to look at some type of funding increase for the next year
- Nongame Merger Conservations Services Business Plan to the Director for Review National Heritage Program
- Attended the roundtable discussion on the importance of state management of wolves on January 19 at the SHOT show in Las Vegas in coordination with Field and Stream
- Distributed copies of *The Secret World Inside the Animal Rights Agenda* (Appendix 44, Exhibit 19)

Commissioner Reports

Each Commissioner provided their Regional report in written format (Appendix 44, Exhibit 20).

Commissioner Trevey referenced his written commission report.

Commissioner Wheeler reported that there are a lot of elk in the region. There are reports of big deer this year. Things are going well in the Region, staff does a good job.

Commissioner Budge reported the preliminary deer survey results indicate that the buck/doe ratio is down. It has been a hard winter with a high volume of elk depredation complaints. There is a lot of excitement on getting the Edson Fichter urban fishing pond open. The community raised a \$100,000 to match funds for this project. Commissioner Budge is hearing good reports on the new fishing regulations. The Southeast Region enjoyed the best upland bird season – pheasants and Hungarian partridge in recent memory. Year one of the pilot surragator program is complete, the next meeting is scheduled for February 16th.

Commissioner Power reported that the region is conducting aerial elk and deer surveys. The buck/doe ratios came out fairly good in the Salmon Region. There have not been very many depredation hunts. There is not much snow in the Stanley Basin. Reports that there have been a number of reported wasted elk and antelope. Andy Smith sponsored first Idaho Trapper's Education Class in Challis, 21 students from 8 years old to adults, 9 instructors certified, 19 certified students classroom and field exercises.

Commissioner McDermott reported that the summer WAFWA meeting will be July 15-20 in Big Sky, Montana and encouraged other Commissioners to plan to attend. The Panhandle water level is at 150%. Winter kill should not be a problem this year.

Commissioner Barowsky reported that the Southwest Region has depredation problems with elk. Feeding turkeys in the Weiser area due to the winter conditions. Fisheries staff recently completed a mark-recapture abundance estimate for carp in Lake Lowell, where the non-native fish is impacting sportfishing opportunities and water quality. Staff are assessing feasibility of carp removal or eradication to improve fishing in the lake. Fisheries staff and volunteers completed electro-fishing population surveys on the lower Boise River from Barber Park to Eagle. Wild trout continue to provide much of the fishing in this urban river, there are 5,116 wild trout per mile.

Commissioner Wright reported that a total of 450 pheasants were released at the Niagara Springs WMA during December. The third annual chili cook-off attracted over 60 sportsmen. Presentations on fish and wildlife aging techniques, predator calling, and a variety of prizes filled the evening. A bull moose was captured in the Burley skate board park and relocated to the Cottonwood WMA.

Chairman Wright reported an issue in the Magic Valley Region with state agencies conflicting. He referenced a letter from Idaho Parks and Recreation Board (IPRB) sent to registered snowmobile owners dated January 7, 2011 (Appendix 44, Exhibit 21) regarding USFS travel planning and the Couch Summit. This may conflict with Department comments to the Forest Service regarding the necessity to keep snowmobiles out of specific areas to protect the elk population.

Commissioner Trevey reported the same type of letter was sent to OHV's users in the Clearwater Region, implying that Fish and Game is the reason that they will not be able to enjoy their OHV. This is a serious issue with the IPRB and both agencies must respect each other's authorities and have a coordinated voice. The Nez Perce Travel Plan is the next test.

Commissioner McDermott reported a similar letter in the Panhandle Region regarding the closing of boat ramps.

The Commission consensus is that the Chairman Wright and Vice Chairman McDermott should meet with the Governor to discuss. The Commission suggests this as a possible agenda item for the May Commission meeting.

Director Groen asked to further review these Commission concerns with the State Parks Director and report back to the Commission.

MISCELLANEOUS

Adjournment

11-09 Commissioner Barowsky moved and Commissioner McDermott seconded a motion to adjourn. The motion carried in a unanimous vote.
