

## LIVE WILDLIFE CAMERA INSTALLED!

Are you sitting at your desk at work, wishing you could be strolling through the Nature Center enjoying the beautiful trees, bubbling creek and serene water? Well, now you can visit the Nature Center....or parts of it at least, from any computer! Our three live camera angles allow you to peek in on interesting happenings on the MKNC grounds. In the spring, the camera will be spotlighted down on a goose nesting in her box. Watch all spring as the eggs are cared for and finally hatch. Other times, the camera will be pointing down toward our apple tree where we tend to get a lot of wildlife action. Yet another angle is our most popular, the underwater view! This view allows you to see Idaho native trout and suckers, mountain whitefish and salmon swimming in the alpine lake. Remember, IDFG receives **NO** tax dollars and nongame animals receive **NO** hunting and fishing license sales dollars, so donate via your Idaho State Income Tax form today!!

On the second page of Idaho Individual Tax form 40, line 35 gives you the opportunity to donate to the Nongame Wildlife Conservation Fund. This fund supports 95% of Idaho's wildlife species (animals that cannot be hunted, trapped or fished). Besides purchasing a wildlife license plate for your car, this is the only way to donate to this fund.
